Enjoy the summer weather while slowly drifting down the Yarra River. Sport lovers will enjoy the "river gardens" cruise, which glides past the Melbourne Cricket Ground, Olympic Park and Melbourne Park. Prices start at AU\$22 (\$\$22) per person for a 75-minute tour.

❖ Healesville Sanctuary (Badger Creek Rd, Healesville, tel: +61 (0)3 5957 2800) Spend a day in a tranquil setting, viewing more than 200 species of Australian wildlife. Most were injured or orphaned at one point, so those that can't be returned to the wild call Healesville home. Be sure to catch the "meet the keeper" presentations. Admission is AU\$24 (S\$24) for adults and AU\$12 (S\$12) for kids. Open ≝ 9am-5pm daily.

Over 30 food vendors dish out local produce, while 150 others sell everything from plants to jewellery. Add free entertainment and four licensed bars showcasing the state's best wines and beers and you've got the recipe for a great night out.

With over 4,000 magazine titles, many of them slightly offbeat, this store should be a second home for anyone with a hobby. With a comfortable lounge upstairs, free wifi, knowledgable staff and coffee on the premises, it's tempting to spend the day here.

Fresh, top-quality ingredients and a strict attention to detail are constants. Bookings are advised but takeaway is available. The Corner Hotel boasts a huge rooftop beer garden that is widely considered to be the city's best. Moreover, their band room plays host to great music by top acts nearly every night of the week. Throw in a great pub grub menu and you've got the quintessential Melbourne pub.

* Section 8, (27 Tattersalls Lane) What once was a carpark hidden in the back laneways of the city has emerged as one of the

liveliest outdoor bars in town. Highlights include impromptu DJ sessions, crates used for seating and, well, the ship container toilets.



After completing a multimillion dollar refurbishment last year, this former budget hotel was reborn as a stylish boutique property. For an added bonus, the Queen Victoria Market is just minutes away. Rates start from AU\$174 (S\$171) for a double. \$\$

❖ Eco Beach YHA (5 Pascoe St, Apollo Bay) Situated on the Great Ocean Road in the town of Apollo Bay, the Eco Beach YHA is widely regarded as one of Australia's best hostels. Millions were spent on its construction and it shows, with a range of amenities typically found in five-star hotels: rooftop decks overlooking the sea, plasma TVs and kitchenettes. Dorm rooms start at AU\$32 (S\$32), while doubles and twins start at AU\$88 (S\$87). Early bookings are essential. \$



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

But it takes the keen eye and expertise of an indigenous guide to fully explain the habits, beliefs and culinary skills of Australia's indigenous communities. Two-hour tours cost AU\$42 (S\$42).

* Adelaide Oval Tours (North Adelaide, tel: +61 (0)8 8300 3800) One of the world's most eye-catching sports venues, the Adelaide Oval offers daily tours showcasing a range of memorabilia including that of legendary cricketer Don Bradman. There's also an insider's look into the historic scoreboard, which is still operated via ropes and levers. Tours begin at 10am and cost AU\$10 (\$\$10).

Blending Chinese cuisine with South Australia's finest produce, Concubine's refined setting and modern décor offer visitors the chance to experience the best of South Australia. Concubine's South Australian prawns in a coconut curry with kaffir lime leaf (AU\$24/S\$24) is excellent though set menu dishes are

also available. Open Tues-Fri and Sun from noon-2pm and 6pm-10pm. Sat from 6pm-10pm. \$\$

❖ Willunga Farmers Market (Willunga Village Square, Willunga, tel: +61 (0)8 8556 4297) Just 30 minutes from the city, Willunga plays host every Saturday to farmers from across the Fleurieu Peninsula. Start with a honey-infused hot chocolate and take a stroll around the stalls, which offer everything from freshly caught oysters to homemade egg and bacon pies. Open 8am-12.30pm. \$

❖ Apothecary 1878

Named after the 125-year-old pharmacy cabinets found in the front bar, this heritage-listed wine bar is classically European in design. Rich mahogany furnishings, large chandeliers, and what many believe is the best wine list in town, make it the ideal place to raise a glass.

❖ Gilbert St Hotel (88 Gilbert St, City, tel: +61 (0)8 8231 9909) By day, this grand old corner pub is the ideal place for a few beers. After dark, it becomes a buzzing nightspot specialising in imaginative cocktails. And don't miss their beer garden out back when the sun is shining. On Tuesdays, happy hour prices last all day.



SLEEPOVER

* Majestic Minima

Hotel (46 Melbourne

St, North Adelaide) Effortlessly chic, the Majestic in this trendy city suburb is an architectural triumph and a great value for guests. Rooms are compact but offer all the expected amenities including king-size beds and plasma TVs. The guest terrace on the top floor is the ideal place to enjoy a glass of wine at sunset. Room rates start from AU\$99 (S\$99) for double occupancy. \$

❖ The Hilton Adelaide (233 Victoria Square, City)

One of state's premier hotels, the Hilton is centrally located in Victoria Square, right next to the Central Markets. Its well-appointed rooms offer great views of the city and are furnished to the standard one would expect of the Hilton brand name. Room rates start from AU\$175 (S\$175). \$\$\$
