cclaimed as the cultural heartland of Australia, the rivers decity of Melbourne receives almost .5 million international visitors each year, undoubtedly those searching for the vibrant culse the city is known for. Unlike the ritz and gliz of Sydney, Melbourne has an artistic and thoroughly liveable charm that can be seen and experienced from every angle. Between the beautifully detailed parks and gardens, the hidden laneways full of boutique surprises and the vibrant, streets that embody a migrant history, the first-time visitor will be greeted by a city that creates and intoxicating breath of style, discovery and relaxation.

What is there to do and see in Melbourne?
At first glance, it doesn't seem to have the bridges, beaches or giant pieces of plastic fruit interstate places rely on. But that's the beauty of it

– Melbourne doesn't have to rely on one crawcard because it has 1,CD1 of them. With fine food and wine, local and global shopping, an overflowing calendar of arts to dos, a collection of world-class sporting treats, and an incredible array of hightlife, events and festivals, your options in Melbourne are endless, any time of the year.

This is why Melbourne is considered Australia's home of sport, music, food, fashion and the arts. Here is a guide to help you choose just a few of the things to see and do in this fascinating city.

Sights to See

Relatively new on the scene, Federation Square (www.federationsquare.com.au) has become the unofficial centre of Melbourne. Built in 2002, it houses a diverse array of creativity including the

National Gallery of Victoria: with slaces such as the lan Potter Gallery and its collector of drawings, photography, textiles and galleries dedicated to Aboriginal and Torre's Straight Islander art. It is also home to the Australian Centre for Moving Image (www.acmi.net.au), the first centre of its kind in the world, which focuses on film, digital art and games.

There are numerous restaurants and bars located amongst and around the galleries, some having excellent views of the Yarra Fiver.

■ CROWN ENTERTAINMENT COMPLEX

Easily Melbourne's most controversal attraction, there is more to the place than just the gambling. The real drawcard is their recent policy of attracting Australia's best chefs to build signature restaurants, such as Neil Perry's Rockpool.





Wind your way along the roads that hug the cliff, above the crashing waves

erect amid the churning whitewash. Many local tour groups such as Autopia Tours (www.autopiatours.com.au) and Go West (www.gowest.com.au) offer day trips starting at around AUD90 (SGD116).

Together with the world's best fashion labels having stores located here, comfy drinking holes such as The Pub, and nightly cabaret type performances, days could be spent here without coming up for air (which seems to be their plan).

■ GREAT OCEAN ROAD (THE TWELVE APOSTLES)

No visit to Melbourne could be complete without visiting one of the most scenic coastlines on the planet. Wind your way along the roads that hug the cliff, above the crashing waves, making sure to stop for lunch at the Wye River Pub before viewing the famous Twelve Apostles that stand

Don't Mind The Weather

There's no smoke without fire: the old cliche "four seasons in one day" holds true in Melbourne. Temperatures fluctuate all over the place. Given the city's unique climate, it's always best to carry a hat, sunscreen and a bottle of water, as well as an umbrella and a warm coat. If a TV weather presenter holds a sign that says "sunny with rain", chances are, it's correct.

Melburnians don't complain, however. First flash of sunlight, and they will head running to the park or beer garden for as long as possible, and then as the rain begins, they'll run just as fast to a coffee shop to watch the rain trickle down the shopfront window.

There is a certain freedom knowing it could rain at any time, as it never stops them from going out and participating in what Melbourne has to offer... which is everything.

■ PHILLIP ISLAND PENGUINS

Hundreds of onlookers come to Phillip Island every day just to see these cute little critters come in from the sea each night and slowly waddle their way up the beach. Apparently they have built up a tolerance to camera flashes and the sudden bursts of laughter that coincide with one falling over.

The Phillip Island Penguin Tours (www. penguinislandtour.com.au) offer tours in mini buses for AUD100 (SGD149). Or drive there yourself – tickets to the parade costs AUD17.40 (SGD22.90).

■ ST KILDA BEACH

Often you'll see people playing music on the sand, or perhaps some twilight beach soccer where spectators munch on fresh fish and chips.

But it's not only the beach that is the attraction. Every Sunday, the nearby Esplanade is taken over by the arts and craft market, which sells an assortment of funky things that you never knew you wanted.


Things to Do

■ SPECTATOR SPORT


Melburnians love their sport. I mean, they really really love it. Some suggest that Australia's identity was formed on the sporting field, and Melbourne has always been the country's spot for sports.

There's an activity for every season, and visitors to Melbourne can get deep into that obsession by joining in any of the many sporting highlights, including AFL Football (season runs from March to September), cricket (summer months), Australian Tennis Open (January),









Australian Grand Prix (March), Spring Carnival Horse Racing (October-November), Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix (October), soccer (August to February), rugby (March to September) and basketball (September to March). Tickets to events can be booked at www.ticketek.com.au or www.ticketek.com.au.

■ CATCH A THEATRE SHOW

Grand old theatres built in the late 1800s with gold rush money such as Princess Theatre (1886), Regent Theatre (1929), the Athenaeum Theatre (1886) and the Her Majesty's Theatre (1886) dot the CBD, showcasing musicals, opera and plays.

Shows performing between August and October include *The Phantom of the Opera* and



■ BE FESTIVE

MOUNTAIN GEER AT Bottled BUT NOT Tamed

Every Friday night, a converted factory in Richmond buzzes with the murmur of people, enjoying one of Melbourne's most secret nightspots.

Mountain Goat beer is beloved in Melbourne. Sitting at the bar, sampling all of their four beers (get the 10-dollar sampler) under the shadows of the giant vats is the quintessential inner suburban experience.

■ Howey Place, CBD

This tiny buzzing alleyway is Melbourne's home to the designers. The highlight is its diversity of styles and labels, where well-known and well-

loved designers such as Alannah Hill (shop no 17) share the lane with newer designers such as Jason Grech (no 12). ■ Inner City Penguins www.penguinwaters.


Many have heard of the famous Phillip Island, but few know about the

penguins that live just a few minutes boat ride from the city.

In 1993 Noel Butcher, who was part of an environmental study, gained permission to offer cruises for those who wanted to witness the daily routine of penguins returning home near nightfall. They had been there since 1956, but

have remained secret for almost 40 years. To this day, most locals have no idea as the exact location isn't publicised. Tours leave from the St Kilda Pier every night around dusk. Prices are around AUD40 (SGD51). ■ Fairfield Boathouse, Fairfield Park Drive, tel +61 (0)3 9486-1501, www.fairfieldboathouse.com

Opened in 1908, the "boathouse" is a flashback escape to the past, and popular with new couples, intent on being taken to the romanticism of another era. While you can sit on the verandah and have a Devonshire tea, most come to slowly drift down the Yarra River in the 19th century replica boats, which are based on Thames River pleasure rafts. Or spend hours walking or riding around the tracks that hug the river. Prices start at AUD15 (SGD19) an hour.
